Dear Congregation,

In the November church Newsletter, I wrote to you about the issue of "women in church office" in the Parkersburg CRC. I learned that Classis Northcentral Iowa had decided that women were not to hold the office of pastor in the churches of Classic NC Iowa but each church was to be given the opportunity to decide for themselves whether women would be considered for the leadership role of Elder or Deacon. The topic is not new and has been argued for decades. I do not think that our congregation has ever been given the opportunity to express itself on this matter. At the December 6th congregational meeting, a simple ballot will be presented to inform the council of your views.

I would like to express my view on the issue of women as Elder in our church. I will share a variety of reasons why I am <u>opposed</u> to women serving in the office of Elder in our church. Since we confess that the Bible is "the inspired, infallible, and inerrant Word of God", I believe that Scripture and our church confessions are quite clear as to this decision. What does Scripture say?

The Apostle Paul discussed this issue in several places in Scripture. For example, when he discusses the need for order in church meetings, he says:

- <u>I Corinthians 14: 34-35:</u> "Let your women keep silent in the church, for they are not permitted to speak; but they are to be submissive, as the Law says. And if they want to learn something, let them ask their husband at home; for it is shameful for women to speak in church."
- <u>I Timothy 2: 12-14:</u> "I do not permit a woman to teach or have authority over a man; she must be silent.
- <u>I Timothy 3:1-7</u>: "The saying is trustworthy: If anyone aspires to the office of overseer (elder), <u>he</u> desires a noble task. An overseer must be above reproach, <u>the husband of one wife</u>, sober-minded, self-controlled, respectable, hospitable, able to teach." Michael Brown in *Called to Serve: Essays for Elders and Deacons* lists these characteristics as qualifications for the Office of Elder. (p 10).

One of our church's historic confessions—the Belgic Confession – remains one of the Forms of Unity for the CRC. While the Belgic Confession is not as well known as the Heidelberg Catechism or the Canons of Dordt, it contains valuable content regarding the beliefs and practices of the Reformed Churches. Article 30 in the Confession is devoted to the "Government of the Church" and outlines the basics of Reformed Church government. Three specific offices are described—pastors, elders, and deacons. In describing the office of Elder, author Daniel Hyde (*With Heart and Mouth: An Exposition of the Belgic Confession*) offers these conclusions:

- "The second of these offices is that of elder. The elders are the <u>men</u> in the congregation who with wisdom rule the church along with the minister." (p. 408)
- "We need a generation of men who are intimately acquainted with and devoted to the Word and to applying it in the life of God's people." (p. 409)
- "The people of God must recognize that men fill the offices of minister and elders not lightly, but reverently. To preach
 God's infallible and eternal Word, to shepherd Christ's flock, to administer discipline with the wayward and so protect
 the whole church from the leaven of sin are the holy "work" these offices entail." (p. 424)
- "Paul also tells the church at Philippi that he is going to send Epaphroditus to them. In response, they are to 'receive him in the Lord with all joy and honor such men.' (p. 424)

I did receive a few responses from members of the congregation sharing their opinions of women in church office. One person shared an example by stating she had asked her father over 50 years ago whether she would be a good candidate for the office of Deacon, given her significant banking and secretarial experience. Her father did not think this was a good idea. He was reflecting the position of the *Church Order of the Christian Reformed Church in North America, where* Article 3 of Church Order (in 1976) stated:

"Confessing <u>male</u> members of the church who meet the biblical requirements for office-bearers are eligible for office. Only those who have been officially called and ordained or installed shall hold and exercise office in the church."

The present CRC Church Order (Supplement 3a) states:

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 "All congregations may, but will not be required to, allow women to serve in the office of minister, elder, deacon or commissioned pastor. Every classes shall respect the prerogative of its constituent churches to call and ordain office-bearers according to their biblical convictions."

I have already mentioned that Classis Northcentral Iowa has decided that women were not to hold the office of pastor in the churches of Classis. Each church has been given the opportunity to decide for themselves whether women should be considered for the office of elder and deacon. This is your opportunity to help decide how our church will answer this question.

At the December 6th congregational meeting I will share a ballot asking you to decide two questions:

- Shall women be allowed to serve as Elder in the Parkersburg CRC?
- Shall women be allowed to serve as Deacon in the Parkersburg CRC? Yes No

Ballots will be tabulated and shared with the Council, since the final decision rests with the Council.

I realize that many members may not be present at the December congregational meeting due to the COVID-19 virus. Anyone wishing to receive a ballot on this issue may request one from me by email – druvengad@gmail.com.
