Today we hear Jesus' words of trust in his heavenly Father. From the cross he cries out, "Father, into your hands I commit my spirit!" (Luke 23:46)



Some may hear the word *father* and think of a parent unworthy of trust. We know of fathers who hurt or abuse their children, who are lazy or apathetic, unwilling to care or help. These fathers have hands that aren't there for their families at all. Sometimes, they even abandon their children. There are also fathers who have unrealistic expectations and demands from their children. It's very hard to trust fathers with hands and hearts like these.

But our heavenly Father is very, very different. He is totally trustworthy. He is the kind of Father with whom you want to have a relationship. How do we know this? One way we know the heavenly Father is through his Son. Knowing Jesus, we can commit ourselves into God's hands. Jesus used his hands to heal the sick and give sight to the blind; he used his hands to welcome little children. Jesus used his hands to wash his disciples' feet in an act of humble service. We can trust our heavenly Father's hands because Jesus allowed his hands to be nailed to a cross for us!

During this Coronavirus pandemic, many have fallen ill and have restricted breathing, are on ventilators, in medically induced comas, and fighting for their lives.

At this time, no verse seems more appropriate than Psalm 31:5. The verse reads, "Into your hand I commit my spirit." There are no better hands in which to entrust this situation than the hands of our heavenly Father.

From the cross, Jesus echoed the words of Psalm 31. In doing so, he identified with our helplessness, and he modeled a pattern we can follow. In times of absolute desperation, we can always entrust ourselves into the hands of our heavenly Father. Those hands are totally trustworthy.

Sometimes in life, we are left with no other options. We are at our wits' end. We've run into walls. We're in over our heads and powerless to change the situation. Even in times like this, it is hard for us to yield, to entrust ourselves to someone else's care, but the Lord is worthy of our trust.

As difficult as these times are, they are times for trust. Helpless situations invite us to pray, "Father, into your hands I commit my spirit."

Who better to trust than the One who brings resurrection? What better hands than those that give new life? What better words than those given to us by our Savior, "Father, into your hands, I commit my spirit?"

As you prepare for Good Friday's message of "It Is Finished," and Easter Sunday, please take a few moments to read the suggested daily scriptures.

# IT IS FINISHED - NEW

#### It is finished.

John 19:30

"It is finished," could easily be spoken in a negative sense. We say things like "I'm ruined." "It's all over." "There is no way I could recover from this." "I give up."

Jesus used these words differently, not in defeat, but in triumph. "It is finished," meant that his saving work was completed by his sacrifice on the cross. It is as if he said, "I've done it all. I'm it. My work is the ultimate, the final, the full. Sin is ruined. Death is over. Victory is here!"

Only Jesus has the authority to use these words to rebuke sin and evil. Only Jesus can say, "It is finished," and a new life begins.



Today, consider your secret sins, sins that need to be finished. Then claim Jesus' victory as your own, embracing the forgiveness and the fresh start that are yours, new every morning.
