
IT IS FINISHED

SUFFERING

All of us know something of what it's like to be thirsty. You might also know that roughly 60% of the human body is made up of water. Our organs are especially well-hydrated and even our bones are 30% water. Obviously, water is life and we need it to survive. Depending upon each individual person, we need 2-3 liters of water every day.

Jesus said, "I thirst." But why? Certainly he was not at that point concerned about optimal organ function. Survival was not at issue. Death was certain.

Jesus knew he was nearing physical death and he no longer needed water to sustain his body. All was now finished, John tells us. The Lord's words echo a prophecy from Psalm 69:21 – **They gave me poison for food, and for my thirst they gave me sour wine to drink.**



Jesus spoke these words to fulfill the Scripture. He experienced the desperation the psalmist describes — in full measure. He did so while at the same time bringing salvation. "I thirst" is an expression of suffering and by uttering these words, Jesus indicated his full participation in human suffering.

His experience on the cross was not

just *like* our suffering, it *was* our suffering and of all humanity in the extreme. Jesus was tortured. He was stripped of his dignity. He was degraded, mocked, disregarded, dismissed. He endured multiple layers of suffering. The crown of thorns. The nails. The beatings. The derision of the crowd, the soldiers, and the religious leaders. It was more than physical pain, it was a blow to his very person. The beloved Son of God was treated like an animal at the slaughter by the human beings he created!

Why did he do this? Why did he embrace such unjust suffering?

Isaiah 53:4 states, "Surely he has borne our griefs and carried our sorrows...stricken, smitten by God, and afflicted" for our transgressions. To fulfill Scripture, Jesus suffered our suffering and we are given permission to admit our own needs, our own longings. What distresses you today? What are you suffering? Cry out to God. He knows and hears.

The suffering man who hung on the cross is now your risen King. He thirsts no more. Praise the Savior who suffered for us, who thirsted that we may thirst no more!

As you prepare for next week's message of "Trust," please take a few moments to read the suggested daily scriptures.


TRUST

Father, into your hands I commit my spirit. Luke 23:46

In his time of deepest agony, Jesus trusts God the Father completely.

Jesus' dying statement, "Father, into your hands I commit my spirit," is a word of committal, a word of trust.

How hard it is for us to yield our lives to someone else. Any time we entrust ourselves to another, we risk getting hurt and feeling abandoned. At the most critical moment, Jesus committed his spirit to God the Father. In doing so, he proves



faithful and he proves that the Father is faithful. This Lord is worthy of our trust. In the darkest night, he will not leave us. On the worst of days, his mercy will never cease.
